This is her story...

H.H. Aga Khan III, A.B. "Bull" Hancock III, the Phipps Family,
John Schiff and Nancy Dillman.

70 years in the making...

The chain of events which lead to the conception of Havre de Grace is an epic tale that traces back to the 1940's.

Uvira II (fifth dam)

No 20th century breeder left a greater legacy than the Aga Khan III. Two years after purchasing the fabulous "Flying Filly" Mumtaz Mahal, granddam of *Nasrullah, *Mahmoud, and Abernant and great-granddam of *Royal Charger, the Indian potentate returned to the Doncaster sales to purchase the Son-in-Law filly, Lady Lawless, for about \$28,000 (6,100 guineas).

Lady Lawless was nowhere near as good as Mumtaz Mahal, but produced a filly who may yet develop as long-lasting a legacy in *Uvira II. Sold to the Vicomte de Fontarce to raise funds when the Aga Khan was trapped in Switzerland during World War II, *Uvira II won the Irish Oaks by six lengths, and then sold to Texas oilman, Emmerson J. Woodward.

In 1949, A.B. "Bull" Hancock, Jr. paid a world record \$61,000 for *Uvira II on behalf of Ogden Phipps's uncle John S. Phipps and she produced five stakes winners, including Francis U and General Staff, both the equivalent of modern Grade 1 winners.

*Uvira II's other daughters established branches of her family that include top class runners Iron Ruler, Lawyer Ron, First Dude, Ski Paradise, and Dernier Empereur, but none were in the same class as Missy Baba, who established a lasting matriarchy.



Missy Baba (fourth dam)

It is perhaps prophetic that the pedigree of Missy Baba combined the bloodlines of the greatest English breeder of the 20th century and the greatest French breeder of the century, Marcel Boussac-for Missy Baba and her daughters enriched the studs of the great breeders of the late 20th century.

Her sire, *My Babu was the best miler sired by Boussac's great stallion Djebel, and became an influential broodmare sire through champions Damascus, Gamely, Highest Trump, and Little Current, as well as through Missy Baba.

Bred by John Phipps's son Michael G. Phipps, Missy Baba won only one of seven starts, but produced five stakes winners from 14 foals, best of whom was probably Grade 1 winner Sauce Boat.




William S. Farish of Lane's End bought Missy Baba's stakes winning son, Raja Baba, as a four-year-old and he became Farish's first leading sire standing at Warner Jones's Hermitage Farm, heading the list in 1980. Farish and partner William S. Kilroy also purchased Missy Baba's granddaughter, Lassie Dear (by Buckpasser out of stakes winner Gay Missile), establishing the great branch of Missy Baba's family that includes A.P. Indy, Summer Squall, Lemon Drop Kid, Duke of Marmalade, and Court Vision.

Toll Booth (third dam)

Michael Phipps sold Missy Baba privately to New York banker John M. Schiff in 1970, making Schiff the breeder of her

1971 Buckpasser filly Toll Booth, as well as Sauce Boat. Schiff had already bred champion and great sire Hoist the Flag and champion Droll Role, but he bred a different kind of champion in Toll Booth. A good New York allowance winner, Toll Booth won 3 of 22 starts, but she is one of a handful of broodmares to



Toll Booth's daughters have produced an honor roll of graded stakes winners for various breeders. Grade 3 winner Key to the Bridge, is dam of graded winner Islefaxyou and third dam of graded winner Hot Summer; stakes winner Idle Gossip is granddam of graded winners Solvig and Lady Carlock; stakes winner Tokens Only,

is dam of graded winner, Token Dance, and granddam of graded winner, Gator Dancer. But stakes winner **Toll Fee** has proven to be Toll Booth's most important daughter.

Toll Fee (second dam)

Though not the most talented, Toll Fee was perhaps the toughest of Schiff's daughters of Toll Booth, by Northern Dancer's son Topsider. Toll Fee raced from two through five, winning 7 of 39 starts, winning the Weber City Miss Stakes and placing in four graded stakes. A tough, sound sprinter himself, Topsider imparted much of that toughness to his offspring, siring top-level winners at distances from five furlongs to 1 1/2 miles.

Peter G. Schiff inherited Toll Fee on the death of his father in 1987 and bred and raced her best offspring, her first foal, The Bink. Beaten only a neck in the Interborough Handicap (G3),

The Bink never quite won the stakes race her talent deserved, but placed in five stakes.

Peter Schiff also bred and raced The Bink's near-champion daughter **Riskaverse**, who won three Grade 1 races among her 9 wins for \$2.1-million. Riskaverse's half-sister, Cozzy Corner, was also talented and tough, winning the Valley View S. (G3).

Toll Fee's other daughters have contributed to the family's ever-expanding legacy, producing graded winners **Bouquet Booth** and Tasteyville. Those four graded stakes winners descending from Toll Fee inherited her toughness as well as her talent, racing an average of 31 times each.



Easter Bunnette (first dam)

Peter Schiff sold Havre de Grace's dam, Easter Bunnette, in training and she won the last three of her 11 starts. Veteran Kentucky breeder Nancy Dillman paid \$450,000 for Easter Bunnette at the 2003 Keeneland November breeding stock sale and has bred each of her foals, including current two-year-old Brabbham, by Bernardini, who topped the 2011 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga sale of selected yearlings at \$1.2-million.


Easter Bunnette's sire, Carson City, is justly famous for injecting speed into pedigrees, particularly through his daughters, who have already produced Grade 1 winners Barbaro, Rail Trip, Stormello, Lear's Princess, A Z Warrior, Ancona, Magic Lamp, Sonrisa, and Swiss Ace, in addition to Havre de Grace.




Saint Liam (sire)

Havre de Grace's sire, Saint Liam, was the apotheosis of the breeding career of another great American breeder, the late Ned Evans, who developed the family through three generations over two decades. Horse of the Year in 2005, Saint Liam, sired four graded winners in his only crop, and his tragic death after only one season at stud was an enormous loss for the breeding industry.


Over the last 70 years, the world's greatest breeders have applied the sternest Darwinian principals of selection to the family descending from the Aga Khan's Lady Lawless, with Marcel Boussac, the Phipps family, the Schiff family, Will Farish, and Ned Evans all making invaluable contributions. Every sire along the female line of Havre de Grace—a list which includes some of the greatest sires of the 20th century—was a top racehorse and every one of them sired top-class runners over a variety of distances. And every mare along her female line has produced supremely talented runners.




In the fall of 2008, a beautiful bay filly by Horse of Year Saint Liam, out of Easter Bunnette, caught the eye of renowned bloodstock agent,

Tom McGreevy, at the Keeneland
September sale.

He purchased her for \$380,000 on behalf of Fox Hill Farm owner Rick Porter, who named the filly Havre de Grace after the old race track in the port city of Havre de Grace, Maryland—where legends such as Man O' War, Seabiscuit, War Admiral, and Sir Barton competed many years ago.

Havre de Grace broke her maiden by 4 3/4 lengths on September 30th of her two-year-old year in maiden special weight company at Delaware Park.

She began her three-year-old campaign with a decisive allowance victory on May 10th, 2010.





Classic Rivalry: Havre de Grace versus Blind Juck



On the road to the Breeders' Cup, Havre de Grace battled champion Blind Luck in a classic three-race-duel for the ages.

Havre de Grace came up just a neck short of her more seasoned rival in both the Grade 2 Delaware Oaks and Grade 1 Alabama Stakes, but she turned the tables with a breakthrough victory over Blind Luck in the Grade 2 Cotillion Stakes on October 2nd, 2010.



On Breeders' Cup Day 2010,

Havre de Grace made only the eighth start

of her career and ran a game third behind

Bill Mott's multiple Grade 1 winning mare

Unrivaled Belle, who earlier in the year

had defeated Horse of the Year

Rachel Alexandra.

While 2010 proved Havre de Grace's class at the highest level, the switch to trainer

Larry Jones following the Breeders' Cup propelled her to greatness. Under Jones, she won 5 or her next 6 starts, including her first Grade One victory in the Apple Blossom

Handicap (G1), the Azeri Stakes (G3) and Obeah Stakes (G3).





Throughout the racing world, eyes were turning in her direction, and the rising star did not disappoint.



In her next start, Havre de Grace followed with another brilliant performance in the Grade 1 Beldame Stakes at Belmont Park. She won by over 8 lengths, dominating a field that included Royal Delta, who had just won the Grade 1 Alabama Stakes and would subsequently win the Grade 1 Breeders' Cup Ladies Classic on her way to an Eclipse Award as champion three-year-old filly.

Following her remarkable 2011 campaign, Havre de Grace won racing's most prestigious title, Horse of the Year, joining super fillies

AZERI (G1)

RACHEL ALEXANDRA (G1)

ZENYATTA (G1)

as one of only 11 distaffers in history to win racing's highest honor.











In her next outing, she trounced the field with an easy 4 1/2 length victory in the New Orleans Ladies Stakes at the Fair Grounds in March of 2012. The race was to be a prelude to her next start, the Grade 2 La Troienne, in which she was the heavy favorite.

But during a workout at Churchill Downs, she injured her right front ankle. A few days later, owner Rick Porter made the difficult decision to retire his champion filly.









Her career featured Grade One wins at Oaklawn, Belmont and Saratoga.

She won graded stakes at **five different tracks**, earned more than **\$2.5 million** and defeated **nineteen** individual Grade One winners, including

Flat Out, To Honor and Serve, Uncle Mo, Stay Thirsty, Acoma,

Awesome Maria, Switch and Royal Delta.

Her blistering speed was evidenced by **triple digit**Beyer Speed Figures in **10** of her last **11** starts...

And she has left a legacy that will surely include induction into the **National Thoroughbred Racing Hall of Fame.**


















And now, the stage is set for Havre de Grace to follow in the hoofprints of her famous forebearers and continue the family dynasty which began nearly 70 years ago.
