QUIDURA

A multiple graded stakes winning and multiple grade one placed racemare at the top of her game, Quidura is by one of the world's great sires from a prolific and champion producing family.

Racing in Europe, Quidura won over seven furlongs in her only start at two. Switching to the U.S. after just one further outing, she captured both her starts at three, winning a Keeneland allowance on her debut stateside, then decisively defeating graded stakes winners Linda, My Impression, and Cheekaboo to take the Valley View Stakes (gr. III).

This year, Quidura has demonstrated herself to be, without question, one of the best turf mares around. Making only her fifth career start, she began her campaign with a third to Dickinson and Lady Eli in the Jenny Wiley Stakes (gr. I), defeating champion and multiple grade one winner Catch a Glimpse, grade one winner Illuminant, grade one winner Time and Motion, and grade two winner Goodyearforroses.

Just a length shy of catching multiple group and graded stakes winner Hawksmoor in the New York Stakes (gr. II), Quidura still had daylight to spare over such as multiple grade one winning champion Dacita, grade one winner Sea Calisi, and graded stakes winners Suffused and Summersault.

Quidura's standing amongst the nation's distaff turf performers was emphasized by her magnificent run in the Diana Stakes (gr. I) at Saratoga. Setting out to make every post a winning one, Quidura was only denied in the shadow of the wire by the wonderful Lady Eli, the outstanding turf mare of her generation in the U.S. for four straight years. The time was less than a second outside the course record for the nine furlongs, and among the defeated were such as grade one winners Antonoe, Harmonize, and Dickinson.



Quidura's rich vein of form continued in her most recent start, which saw her triumph in the Canadian Stakes (gr. II), while accounting for graded stakes winners Starship Jubilee and Grizzel. The Canadian Stakes marked Quidura's third straight triple digit Beyer Speedfigure – she has run 100, 102 and 100 on her last three outings – making her one of only a handful of U.S. fillies or mares to achieve that feat in 2017.

Quidura is a daughter of Dubawi , a champion racehorse is who is now one of the world's great sires with 138 stakes winners, 90 graded, and 31 group or grade one, including Postponed, Makfi, Poet's Voice, Night of Thunder, Al Kazeem, Hunter's Light, Prince Bishop, Dubawi Heights, New Bay, Monterosso, Left Hand, Erupt, and Sheikhzayedroad, and the 2017 group or grade one winners Bateel, Sobetsu, Zarak, Nezwaah, and Almanaar. Dubawi has also made remarkably headway as a broodmare sire this year. His first stakes winner in this role came in July this year, and since then he has added four more new individual black-type scorers each of them two-year-olds. As a Mr. Prospector line horse, Dubawi offers an alternative for Europe's dominant Northern Dancer sire lines of Galileo and Danzig.

Quidura is a half-sister to Querari, Champion Older Horse in Germany, and also winner of the Gr.1 Premio Presidente della Repubblica, and to group winner Quasillo, the top-rated middle-distance three-year-old in Germany in 2015. Her dam, the stakes placed Quetena, is half-sister to Quilanga, a group winner in France; to stakes winners Quixote and Quinindo; and to group placed Quebra, the dam of multiple graded winner Quarterback (American Post), and granddam group winner Queenie. The granddam, Quebrada, was Champion at two and three in Germany, and is out of Queen to Conquer, who took third in the Irish Oaks (gr. I), before going on to capture the Yellow Ribbon Stakes (gr. I), Santa Ana Stakes (gr. III), and two renewals of the Ramona Handicap (gr. II) in the U.S.

A standout racemare at the top of her form, Quidura has only made eight lifetime starts, and so clearly has tremendous potential to race on. She is also by one of the



world's great sires, from a rich family that has proven itself on both sides of the Atlantic, which gives her tremendous appeal as a broodmare prospect.
